ENGLEWOOD - HISTORIC SITES BROCHURE



Englewood Historic Preservation Society is gathering information to produce a brochure or booklet describing the many historic sites within or belonging to our beautiful city. Unlike some cities that have a "historic district," which could be visited and enjoyed as a walking tour, Englewood has historic sites of interest scattered over a wide area. To be sure, there a few of them clustered together, but to make a comprehensive tour of them all, it would be too much to do on foot. Those who want to do the tour unassisted, brochure in hand, could try it on a bicycle or in a car. In addition to that, we are working on scheduling bus tours.

Here are just a few of the many places worth a visit: The Gothic Theater, Rockybilt Hamburger Stand, The Thomas Skerritt House (the first house built in Englewood), Mayflower Church, The Allen Water Treatment Plant, and McLellan Reservoir. Many people may wonder why the McLellan Reservoir would be worthy of inclusion in a tour of Historic Englewood. Thanks to some of our former city fathers, Englewood owns some of the most senior water rights in the state. This makes water for residents relatively inexpensive and plentiful, and provides revenue from the sale of water to other municipalities. I bet most of us have driven by a lot of these places, but how many of us know the history behind them? How about Miller Field? It looks like any other small park and ball field, but there's quite a story behind it.


