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#### History Mystery

The Englewood Historic Preservation Society got a phone call from an attorney, Michael Poindexter in Lakewood whose wife found an Englewood High School class ring from a 1961 graduate. Mike and his wife would like to find the owner and return the lost ring. What can an historic society do to help? I knew we did not have any records from those days and have not found any in the history closet in the library. I meet with members of the 1960s classes from Englewood High School every month, and I asked them for help. I was told the school district does not keep those kinds of records, and neither does the high school. One of the people had a year book from 1961 and offered to look up all the people with those initials. I got an email a few hours later from Betty Keddington with a name and phone number. I gave the name to Michael and they contacted the person The ring will be reunited with its owner in early May.

# The Red and White Grocery Store 275 E. Girard Ave.

The year was 1910. Englewood was seven years old and was just beginning to grow from scattered farms into a town. A man came to town who had emigrated from Canada. He had first gone to Delta, Colorado and farmed. Then, he tried his hand gold mining near Berthoud Pass. That venture became too

expensive having to pay to have the ore shipped to Pueblo. Then, he moved to downtown Denver and purchased a grocery store. His name was Herman McCready. His grocery store on Larimer St. was successful and some of his best customers were the ladies of the night. He saw an opportunity to open a store in the new town of Englewood. He found a piece of vacant land on the corner of Girard and Grant and had a building constructed. The store opened in 1910 and served the citizens until 1927 when he died.



The McCready's lived in an apartment on the first floor and rented out eight sleeping rooms upstairs. The people upstairs shared one bathroom. A rumor around suggests that some of the ladies from downtown Denver moved to Englewood around the same time and lived upstairs. I have not been able to confirm that. A relative remembers Mrs. McCready shoveling coal into the giant furnace in the basement. That furnace and the coal storage room are still there but the furnace uses natural gas instead of coal these days.

Red and White Grocery was one of many local markets around Englewood. Before Safeway, King Soopers, Walmart and 7-11, people bought supplies at the neighbor hood stores. Bob's Grocery at the corner of Washington and Floyd is the last one I know about that is still in business. If you look carefully as you drive around, you will see a number of buildings with corner entrances. Many of those were neighborhood stores in former years. One former corner store at 4293 South Cherokee Street that operated into the 1980's, doesn't have the characteristic diagonal entrance, but rather a "false front", with the entrance facing Cherokee. It is now a private residence.



The McCready children continued to live in Englewood for many years. Ginger Shirey graduated from Englewood High School in 1952. She must have been in the first class graduating from the new high school that had just opened that year. The building was converted to apartments in the 1940s and is still in use as an apartment house. Much of the information for this story came from an article in the Englewood Independent Jan. 17, 1979.
