August 6th - Wednesday


Monthly EHPS Meeting from 6:30 - 8:30 pm at the City Center Community Center, Suite 118. Everyone is welcome!

We would like to hear from our members about their interest in participating in these field trips, and offer suggestions about other places we should visit. Your feedback will help us as we establish firm scheduling for these events.




This is what we hope will be the first of a series of regular columns in the EHPS Newsletter on the subject of Faith, and the way it has helped to shape the past, present and future of our home, the City of Englewood, Colorado. Following this introduction, I will submit the first installment, based on the faith community I know best, the Roman Catholic Church. We, the staff of this newsletter, invite other EHPS members to submit stories to be published on this subject in future issues. It is not our intention to proselytize, but rather to tell the history of each faith tradition in Englewood, and how each place of worship participates in the life of the community at large. However, anyone who reads these columns and feels inclined to learn more about a particular place of worship is welcome to attend a service and find out if they feel welcome there.

From the very beginnings of the settlement of the Colonies that eventually became the United States of America, people came in search of religious freedom. It took some time to formalize the guarantee of that freedom in our Constitution, but it has become one of the hallmarks of our way of life in this country. Colorado, as far back as when it was a portion of the Kansas Territory, was a microcosm of that pursuit of freedom of all kinds, including religious freedom. As areas were settled and towns were established, churches and other places of worship were among the first public structures to be built.

Englewood, being a suburb of a major city, is intimately connected with the metropolitan area, yet retains an identity and style of its own. Just as is true throughout the country, Christian sects collectively account for a majority of faith groups, although many other traditions are represented, including Jewish, Muslim, Mormon, various non-denominational churches, and many others too numerous to list. We will attempt to present the articles provided to us without judgement or show of favoritism, in the hope that this column will be well received by all who read it.



Saint Louis Church is the oldest Catholic Church in Englewood, having been established as a parish less than a decade after the incorporation of the City in 1903. In less than a year, the church was built at 3310 South Sherman Street, and Mass was first celebrated there on July 11, 1911. More than a hundred years later, it still stands tall and strong, providing worship space for an active parish. The current pastor is Rev. Robert Reycraft. Saint Louis Parish has an elementary school, and supports many ministries. Besides those that are faith-based and established for the spiritual enrichment of parishioners, the parish provides outreach to area hospitals, and manages Saint Vincent House, the creation of former pastor Rev. Roger Mollison. The House provides shelter for families of patients in local hospitals who cannot afford hotel rooms while visiting their loved ones.





There are several other Catholic Churches with an Englewood address, but the only other one actually within the city boundaries is All Souls Church at 4950 South Logan Street, under the leadership of Rev. Bob Fisher. This is my parish, and it serves my spiritual needs very well. All Souls is a vibrant faith community with a 60 year history and a myriad of activities, serving both the parishioners and the surrounding community. All Souls also has an elementary school with outstanding credentials and active youth groups for several age levels. The parish sponsors many events which are open to the public.

So why are there Catholic Churches spaced approximately every mile or two along Sherman and Logan Streets, all the way from the Cathedral of the Immaculate

# THE IMPACT OF FAITH ON THE HISTORY OF ENGLEWOOD continued

Conception on Colfax and Logan in Denver to All Souls Church? The story, as told by the late Monsignor Thomas Barry and recounted in the 2004 issue of the All Souls Parish Directory, is this: Archbishop Urban Vehr, 4th Archbishop of Denver from 1931 to 1967, stood on the steps of the Cathedral one day looking south along Logan Street, and realizing that the metropolitan area was growing in size and population, thought there should be a Catholic Church within walking distance from every Catholic family, so within about eight miles of the Cathedral you will find Mother of God Church, Saint Francis de Sales, Our Lady of Lourdes, Saint Louis and All Souls, all on Logan or Sherman Streets.



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
